FROM THE INTERIM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

As I look back on the whirlwind that was 2023, I'm reminded of the unique challenges and triumphs that have defined our journey as a dance community. From navigating the aftermath of lockdowns, to confronting an unprecedented cost of living crisis, it's been a year of profound adversity. Fueled by passion and resilience, we witnessed our incredible sector prove its strength through these obstacles, and as such, we were motivated to deepen our commitment to dance advocacy and education. We strategically reinvested finances into the sector to increase participation and reach, while allocating more resources to dance education in all corners of the state.

With immense pride, I can share that we've connected dance to over 5,700 students through accredited dance training and Victorian curriculum-based education—a feat made possible by the Victorian Department of Education's response to our advocacy and inspiring belief in the benefits of dance. This collaboration has not only expanded arts education into the heart of regional Victoria, but also ensured that over 80% of these students could immerse themselves in dance, free of charge.

We remained the leading provider of VET dance in Victoria and strengthened our programs by advancing our online learning software to better equip students across Australia with the skills and confidence to pursue their dance careers. Easier access and more streamlined training is contributing to the betterment of standards and outcomes within our industry.

This year marked the launch of our Education Advisory Group, a gathering of some of the most brilliant dance minds. Their wisdom and insights

> have been instrumental in refining our curriculum and advocacy strategies, paving the way for enriched education for dancers across Victoria.

Our biannual State of the Sector Dance Census provided us with critical, up-to-date data and insights that contribute to guiding our advocacy, education development, and interactions with policymakers and stakeholders. Through 54 engagements, from departmental meetings and industry committees to collaborations with Youth Dance Australia, we've championed the voices and needs of our members.

The collective effort of the Frame: A Biennial of Dance partners was nothing short of inspiring. The festival not only showcased the vibrancy and diversity of our dance landscape but also underscored the critical need for sustained investment in our art form. The festival's success—a testament to the creativity and hard work of 284 artists—captivated 16,000 attendees and sparked a call to action for greater government support.

We recognise that this was a particularly difficult year for our First Nations people and members, and that many wanted a different result from the Voice to Parliament referendum. Notwithstanding the result, our commitment to truth, reconciliation, and uplifting Indigenous voices remains unwavering. As we forge ahead, these principles will illuminate our path, shaping a 2024 program that honours First Nations knowledge and creativity.

The past year has been a journey of passion, perseverance, and community. It's a narrative of a dance sector that, despite the odds, dances on with hope and determination. Here's to continuing our advocacy, expanding our horizons, and to a future where every dancer has the opportunity to shine.

Inquiry into the National Cultural Policy

In July, Ausdance VIC represented the dance sector at the Inquiry into the National Cultural Policy at the request of the Federal Government. Working in collaboration with the national Ausdance network, we asked that dance be explicitly recognised across the five pillars and requested more support for First Nations dance across the sector.

Implementation of our Education **Advisory Group**

In 2023, we recruited a number of new dance artists and educators from across a

Servicing Our Membership Base

Our membership base has shifted post-COVID, and 2023 was a year of consolidation as we focussed on understanding their needs and how to best service them. In 2023, we developed resources and education programs aligned with our members' needs and streamlined our communications. We consulted our members through surveys, post-event questionnaires, and phone/ email consultations.

Get Active Kids Voucher Program

Following on from our successful advocacy campaigns from 2020 and 2021 with the Victorian State Government, the Get Active Kids voucher program is in its third year. Dance continued to achieve one of the highest activity attendance rates and voucher reimbursements across the state. This program expands accessibility to dance and provides a valuable means of business growth for dance studios and organisations, particularly in regional and rural areas. In 2023, over 1,400 vouchers for dance were reimbursed. All participants were kids from a family/guardian who met the criteria of holding a Health Care Card.

Curriculum **Feedback & Education Program Design**

As the subject association for dance in Victoria, we maintain strong partnerships with Victorian government departments and are consulted on curriculum development and reform. We then use this knowledge, along with feedback directly from member organisations, as well as RTO partners and teachers, to inform the development of our education programs. Our delivery of nationally accredited training programs also informs our understanding of curriculum application and allows us to influence the quality of graduates entering the arts and entertainment industry.





CENSUS KEY TAKEOUTS

Dance Is For Everyone and Every Body

- It creates communities and career pathways, and positively impacts the mental, physical, and social wellbeing of all who engage with it.
- 98% of recreational dancers feel dance is a meaningful social activity.
- 67% of professionals in dance see themselves working in the industry for the next five years.
- 85% of students feel their learning environment is supportive and safe.
- 94% of businesses feel their activity is meaningful.

Dancers Are Lifelong Learners

The dance community shows remarkable dedication to the art form, their ongoing personal learning journeys, and a commitment to helping the dancers of tomorrow. The top three subjects of interest are:

- Dance Training & Education 60%
- Safe Dance Practices 57%
- Choreography Practice 48%

Declining Trends in Student Safety

80% of 16-24 year-olds felt physically safe in their dance classes, compared to 95% in 2021. Major injuries also increased to 26%, up from 20% in 2021. This means more students and pre-professional dancers experienced an injury that required surgery or left them with permanent damage.

Declining Mental Health

In 2023, almost 9% of respondents indicated they were living with a diagnosed mental illness. This is up from 4.5% in 2021. Students had the highest reported rate of mental illness.

Discrimination in Dance

Overall, there is little discrimination based on disability, gender, or sexual identity, but discrimination based on age, race, and physical appearance have been identified. Professionals in dance were more likely to experience all types of discrimination compared to other cohorts.

Precarity for Creatives

- More than 25% do not get paid for their time spent in rehearsal.
- 69% must supplement their income with non-dance-related activity.
- 29% feel their employment is insecure or very insecure.

Businesses Experiencing Financial Strain

- 40% were profitable in the 22-23 financial year.
- 55% supplement their dance income from other sources.
- 41% say their business is likely to be financially unstable over the next two years.

Ausdance VIC Programs

We continually develop programs that support and generate inclusive access to dance right across the state. Our programs are informed by and designed in collaboration with the sector; they address skill gaps, are aligned with school and VET curricula, and generate employment opportunities for dance professionals.

In 2023, almost 2,500 students in rural and regional Victoria participated in our Blue Sky Dance education program and 32 primary school teachers received professional development sessions and resources. We are thrilled to announce we have received funding from the Department of Education, through the Rural and Regional School Reform initiative to deliver this popular program again in 2024.

We also launched a new, elite dancer enrichment program aimed at secondary dance students. LIFT provides free access for students from government secondary schools to participate in industry-leading dance workshops, mock auditions, and showcases. Offered over a number of sessions throughout 2023, this program successfully engaged 564 students and employed 23 dance professionals. It has been funded for delivery again in 2024 and 2025, through the Victorian Challenge and Enrichment Series.

Our professional development series, Inside Dance, connected our membership and the broader sector with key representatives from OneMusic, Joel Bray, Dr Katrina Rank, and the Arts Wellbeing Collective. The topics explored included music licensing requirements, choreographic practices, child-safe standards, and mental health.

Ausdance VIC communication and marketing activities utilised paid, owned, earned, and shared channels to engage members, promote our advocacy initiatives and sector opportunities, and encourage participation with our broad dance education offering.

A major emphasis in 2023 was refreshing the Ausdance VIC website. The information architecture was updated to improve the user experience and new content was added to reflect the complete education and program offering. Interviews with high-profile dance artists and teachers, along with updates on advocacy and representation initiatives, ensured the website remained fresh and relevant to returning visitors. This was reflected in the high number of returning visits to the website. Another key driver of website visitation was the partnership with the Department of Education for Education Week 2023. This digital resource was created using the Activate! program and increased concentration in the classroom by using small dance-based brain break activities.
