



Inspire: Primary Workshop Resource

Teaching Artist: Amelia Jean O'Leary

INTRODUCTION

Inspire is a professional learning program for dance educators, presented by Ausdance VIC. The 90-minute workshops provide insights into the recent works, processes, and dance-making skills of local choreographers Amelia Jean O'Leary, Luke Currie-Richardson and Joel Bray.

Created in direct response to feedback from teachers, *Inspire* is designed to offer a unique opportunity for peer-to-peer collaboration and to engage in discipline-based discussions with a focus on Aboriginal and Torres Strait Island dance. Workshops are designed for primary teachers (F-L6) and secondary teachers of L7-10 and senior years (L11-12, VCE Dance).

Participants receive a recording of their workshop, a bespoke resource providing background information, curriculum-alignment and suggestions for integrating the workshop learnings into classrooms. Each participant will also receive the BIG HEART Education Resource, based on BIG DANCE, BIG HEART, choreographed by Frances Rings and Craig Bary. This resource includes eight choreographer-approved lesson plans, created by Dr Katrina Rank and aligned to the Victorian Curriculum.

ABOUT AMELIA JEAN O'LEARY

Amelia Jean O'Leary (she/they/yinarr) is a proud First Nations Gamilaroi Yinarr from Northern New South Wales currently living in Naarm (Melbourne). Their dance practice is about human and spiritual experiencing. Through complexity and adversity, they find ways to tell coded and poetically rich stories. As an independent artist, O'Leary is interested in creating their own soundscapes and projections as part of an integrated practice so that their work spans both the digital and physical realms.

O'Leary has created multiple dance works and films including Yinarr, the film, presented at Yirramboi festival 2020 and Dance (Lens) Festival 2021. After graduating with a Bachelor of Fine Arts (Dance) from the Victorian College of the Arts in 2021, Amelia performed their first full-length work Yinarr in Adelaide Fringe and Dancehouse in 2022. She was also a part of "Collision" by Jo Lloyd presented at Junction Arts Festival and "Garabari" by Joel Bray at Arts House in 2022.

Other recent works include Sad Eyes (Dancehouse Season 1 2025), A Certain Mumble (Darebin Arts Speakeasy) and STAUNCH ASF (Melbourne Fringe), for which they were awarded Best Emerging Indigenous Artist at Melbourne Fringe 2023 and nominated for a Green Room Award for Pioneering Artistry: Breaking Ground. O'Leary also choreographed One Day as part of Melbourne Theatre Company's First Peoples Young Artists Program at Yirramboi Festival. O'Leary is currently developing multiple new works.

Sad Eyes

O'Leary's, Sad Eyes 'queries the importance of dance as a vehicle for change. What if we rebuild the engine? What if this work becomes the world we choose to live in? How can we shift the fantasy to reality? What are your politics? What do you value?'

Through dance and storytelling, Sad Eyes draws to the surface complex intersections of politics, identity and environmental concern, in order to disassemble structures, shift and destroy colonial narratives and ultimately to reframe a conversation on choice and action.

Sad Eyes is an 'emotive and impactful work that makes individuals look within and feel a collective grieving and understanding of the complications that surround us and that are within us. Sad Eyes is a heart racing art work that speaks loudly in the hope to create space for the next generation to be louder and prouder. Politically, culturally, environmentally and also physically, this work is a wellrounded powerhouse of abstract dance and coded storytelling.'

Yinarr

'Yinarr' means 'Aboriginal Woman' in Gamillaraay Language. O'Leary often returns to the ideas behind this work to create new iterations that reflect the ways in which their own perspectives and life experiences have shifted.

Previous iterations:

- Performed in Fan the Flames as part of Deadly Fringe 2019
- Yinarr (film) part of YIRRAMBOI's Resilience in Isolation program, by Amelia Jean O'Leary explores the internal vortex of gender and cultures through an external exploration of physical movement
- Performed at Out of Bounds 2021 presented by Lucy Guerin Inc and Phillip Adams BalletLab.
- Full length live performance work Adelaide Fringe 2022
- Full length (live performance) at Dancehouse 2022 In this iteration of Yinarr, O'Leary provides a glimpse into their discovery and exploration of identity. This is a raw physical depiction of their internal vortex of identity and sisterhood that ripples into the physical, digital and spiritual worlds.

CODED

Presented by Amelia Jean O'Leary, Abbotsford Convent and Midsumma Festival (Abbotsford Convent, January 23 to 25 2025) — *CODED* gives an inside glimpse of the artist's most recent creative projects. The program presented three fifteenminute new First Nations femme queer contemporary dance works, choreographed by O'Leary. The dance works challenge ideas of belonging and identity in a world where queerness is often marked as other. These works included *Ngambaa* (Mother in Gamilaaraay), a trio; *Winangaylanha ngaya nginunha* (I love you in Gamilaraay), a group work and *CODED* a duet that explores the embedding of queerness within landscapes in fear of personification of physicalised queerness.

A Certain Mumble

In A Certain Mumble, O'Leary and Janelle Tan, a Chinese Malaysian dance artist, step through the sticky terrain of conviction and confusion, voice and incomprehensibility, sisterhood and lineage, being watched and being understood. In this intimate new dance work, the two choreographers invite you into the murky realm between the certainty they hold in themselves, the perils of being misunderstood, and the subterranean rumblings that try to convince you that you don't belong here.

WORKSHOP DESCRIPTION

In this workshop Amelia aims to make choreography accessible and will guide you through their choreographic practice — sharing movement tasks, scores, stories, and insights to enrich your understanding of contemporary Indigenous dance and your own movement practice. Activities you may undertake:

- 1. Preparing your body for dance. Body-earth connection guided improvisation to ground participants and connect to place
- 2. Shape and space task
- 3. Embodying creatures and building your own.
